1. Me VS. I: To figure out if you should use "me" or "I", remove the other person's name from the sentence:

Correct: John went to the casino with Ally and me. Incorrect: John went to the casino with Ally and I.



2. That VS. Which: To figure out if you should use "that" or "which", check the clause; if restrictive, use "that"; if nonrestrictive, use "which": Restrictive: The car that was parked down the street was stolen. Non-restrictive: The car, which was parked down the street, was stolen.



3. Lay VS. Lie: To figure out if you should use "lay" or "lie", check for a 'direct object': Direct Object: She lay her bag on the sofa. No Direct Object: I love to lie in the sun during my summer vacation.



4. Then VS. Than: To figure out if you should use "then" or "than", are you comparing two things or do you mean 'in addition to: <u>Comparing:</u> Her slice of pie is bigger than mine! <u>In Addition To:</u> We went to lunch, then to the nail salon.



5. Your VS. You're: To figure out if you should use "your" or "you're", are you trying to say 'you are' or do you want a possessive pronoun?

You Are: You're never going to believe who I saw driving a new car!

Possessive Pronoun: Your cooking skills have improved!
