Welcome, Romance Author!

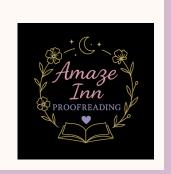

Now comes the part that turns a good story into an unforgettable one—the polish. This checklist is your preeditor toolkit: a way to catch the easy fixes, smooth the rough edges, and make sure your romance arc delivers every emotional beat your readers are craving.

Think of it as a friendly guide, not a red-pen lecture. Work through it in three passes—big picture, scene level, and line level—and you'll send your manuscript to your editor and readers with confidence.

And if you ever want a second pair of eyes that understands romance inside and out, I'm here to help you keep your voice, delight your readers, and make your story shine.





Romance Author Self-Edit Checklist

1. Story & Structure Pass (Big Picture)

- Opening Hook—Does the first page establish tone, POV, and a reason to keep reading?
- Character Goals & Stakes—Are the protagonists' desires and obstacles clear by the end of Chapter 1?
- Romantic Arc—Is there a believable progression from first meeting to emotional/physical intimacy?
- Conflict Balance—Are internal (emotional) and external (plot) conflicts woven together?
- Pacing—Does each scene move the romance or plot forward? Are there slow spots that could be tightened?
- Satisfying Resolution—Does the ending deliver on the promise of the trope (e.g., HEA/HFN)?

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2. Style & Voice Pass (Scene-Level)

- POV Consistency—Is the point of view clear and consistent? Avoid head-hopping unless intentional.
- Show vs Tell—Are emotions shown through action, dialogue, and sensory detail rather than explained?
- Dialogue Flow—Does each character have a distinct voice? Are tags and beats varied?
- Romance Heat Level—Is the sensuality consistent with the intended audience/trope?
- Emotional Beats—Are key moments (first kiss, black moment, resolution) given enough weight and space?
- Tone Alignment—Does the language match the subgenre (sweet, steamy, dark, comedic, etc.)?

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3. Surface & Polish Pass (Line-Level)

- Grammar & Punctuation—Watch for common errors (comma splices, misplaced modifiers, dialogue punctuation).
- Word Repetition—Eliminate overused words or phrases, especially in emotional scenes.
- Filter Words—Reduce "she saw," "he felt," "I realized" to keep prose immediate.
- Adverb Overload—Replace with stronger verbs where possible.
- Formatting Consistency—Check italics for thoughts, scene breaks, and chapter headings.
- Final Read-Aloud—Read aloud or use text-to-speech to catch awkward phrasing or typos.

Bonus Romance-Specific Touches

- Trope Check—Are you delivering the beats readers expect for your chosen trope (enemies-to-lovers, second chance, etc.)?
- Chemistry Audit—Do your leads have enough onpage interaction to justify their connection?
- Sensory Layering— Are you using all five senses to deepen intimacy and setting?
- Reader Promise—Does your blurb, cover, and opening chapter match the tone and content of the book?
